Step back in time and discover the secret underground headquarters that were the nerve centre of Britain's war effort. Walk in Churchill's footsteps through the extensive secret underground site from which he directed the war and which is part of the IWM family. Located in the heart of Westminster, visitors to Churchill War Rooms can view this complex of historic rooms left exactly as they were in 1945. Also housed within the site is the award winning Churchill Museum which combines cutting-edge technology and multimedia displays with rare and significant historical items. Visitors receive a free sound guide to the 30 historic rooms on display as well as the interactive museum, all helping to bring the exciting story of Winston Churchill to life.

Wings: A Century of Aerial Warfare 5 March 2013 From 7pm	In this talk historian and author Patrick Bishop tells the story of the evolution of aerial warfare, from the rickety contraptions that fluttered over the Western Front to the high-tech fast jets and drones operating in Afghanistan today. Patrick will describe some of the extraordinary characters from the Royal Air Force and the Fleet Air Arm, and Churchill's early involvement with the RAF. Tickets £16.50 adults, £13.20 concessions.
The Roar of the Lion: The Making of Churchill's World War Speeches 23 April 2013 From 7pm	It is widely believed that the British people were unanimously enthusiastic about Churchill's wartime speeches. Many were, but others were not. Drawing on contemporary diary and survey evidence, author and historian Richard Toye shows that Churchill's speeches were much more controversial, and much more criticised, than popular myth suggest.
