War Story

Until 30 November 2012

Since the First World War, the Museum has collected people's stories of war and conflict, and now through a new innovative project - *War Story* - the first-hand experiences of British service personnel currently serving in Afghanistan, have been recorded for present and future generations.

The *War Story* display will offer visitors a unique chance to discover the soldiers' compelling stories of their Afghanistan experiences, featuring eyewitness accounts from letters, emails and blogs through to footage and personal belongings.

Albert Adams (1929-2006) Until 1 January 2013

Albert Adams was a talented, South African born Expressionist painter and printmaker who studied at the Slade School of Art, as well as in Rome, Munich and Salzburg. To mark a recent acquisition by IWM, fifteen of his last works will be shown in a new display at IWM London. The prints, paintings and drawings to be shown exude a disturbing power reminiscent of the work of Francisco Goya and Francis Bacon. They express Adams's lifelong passion for justice and world affairs and draw upon themes such as the Holocaust and the Abu Ghraib and Darfur atrocities.

People's War: Second World War Portraits Until 1 January 2013

During the Second World War, artists such as Stanley Spencer, Edward Bawden, Henry Lamb and Ronald Searle created art that captured the war for the official government art scheme as well as out of personal motivation. Portraits played a central role in their work, paying tribute to people's endurance and 'to show Britain and the world "what sort of a people we are". From official oil paintings to informal drawings, this exhibition of Second World War portraits at IWM London offers an insight into personal stories of bravery, survival and death, and a society undergoing tremendous changes.

A Family in Wartime Until 1 January 2013

Take a step back in time to the Second World War and experience life on the Home Front, through the eyes of one London family, the Allpress'. *A Family in Wartime* will explore the lives of William and Alice Allpress and their ten children, looking at what life in London was like during the war. The Allpress family is unique but their experiences of evacuation, the Blitz and D-Day mirror many aspects of a whole generation of British people's lives during the Second World War. *A Family in Wartime* will be brought to life through interactive exhibits, photographs, recorded interviews with the family, archive film footage, paintings, personal documents and an intricate model of the Allpress family home.

Secret War

Ongoing

Secret war has always been controversial. War in the shadows is often so obscure that the armies, battles and even the victories and defeats are secret. Secret War reveals the clandestine world of espionage, covert operations and the work of Britain's Special Forces.

From the development of M15 and M16 before the First World War to Cold War intelligence-gathering and the contemporary use of highly-trained elite forces, the exhibition examines the facts behind the secrecy and why the need for secret agencies remains a subject of continued debate today.

The Lord Ashcroft Gallery: Extraordinary Heroes Ongoing

The Lord Ashcroft Gallery houses the *Extraordinary Heroes* exhibition containing the world's largest collection of Victoria Crosses (VCs), which has been established by Lord Ashcroft since 1986. The 162 awards will go on public display for the first time alongside 48 VCs and 31 George Crosses (GCs) held by IWM. Visitors to the Lord Ashcroft Gallery: *Extraordinary Heroes* can discover the personal stories behind each award on display in the state-of-the-art space filled with interactive touch-screens, multimedia platforms and original interpretation. The gallery examines the concept of bravery and the personal stories behind the award of the medals. Alongside the precious decorations are many objects on display for the first time as well as newly commissioned artwork, film and photography.

Breakthrough

IWM London's permanent Art Gallery – *Breakthrough* – has been refreshed with a new selection of artworks on display in the First World War, Second World War and post-1945 spaces. Taken from IWM's rich collections, one of the most important representations of twentieth century British art in the world, highlights include works by the greatest artists in their day, such as Paul Nash, John Minton and CRW Nevinson, who were employed by the British Government's war art schemes.

The Holocaust Exhibition

This highly-acclaimed exhibition uses film, photographs and a large number of rare artefacts — many brought from Germany and Eastern Europe — to document the history of the Nazi persecution of the Jews and other groups before and during the Second World War.

Crimes Against Humanity

A specially-commissioned 30-minute film is the central element of this exhibition, which examines the themes of genocide and ethnic conflict — looking at some of the common features shared by the horrendous bloodshed in Armenia, Nazi-occupied Europe, Cambodia, East Timor, Bosnia, Rwanda and elsewhere.

Our unique Collections, made up of the everyday and the exceptional, reveal stories of people, places, ideas and events. Using these, we tell vivid personal stories and create powerful physical experiences across our five museums that reflect the realities of war as both a destructive and creative force. We challenge people to look at conflict from different perspectives, enriching their understanding of the causes, course and consequences of war and its impact on people's lives.

IWM's five branches are IWM London, IWM's flagship branch with six floors of exhibitions and displays; IWM North, housed in an iconic award-winning building designed by Daniel Libeskind; IWM Duxford, a world renowned aviation museum and Britain's best preserved wartime airfield; Churchill War Rooms, housed in Churchill's secret headquarters below Whitehall; and the Second World War cruiser HMS *Belfast*.

2014 - 2018 marks the centenary of the First World War, a landmark anniversary for Britain and the world.
