

FASHION ON THE RATION: 1940S STREET STYLE

IWM North, 27 May 2016 – 1 May 2017

After a popular run at IWM London, Fashion on the Ration: 1940s Street Style opened at IWM North. This exhibition explored how fashion survived and even flourished under the strict rules of rationing and how, despite the restrictions, austerity did not put an end to creative design or fashionable trends on the British home front. The exhibition brought together exhibits including clothing, accessories, photographs and film, official documents and publications, artworks, wartime letters, interviews and ephemera, some of which were never on display before.

NICK DANZIGER

IWM London, 4 February – 24 April 2016

Nick Danziger is an award-winning British photographer, author and documentary filmmaker, whose work often speaks for the dispossessed and the disadvantaged. In 2001, Danziger photographed 11 women, all living in the world's major conflict zones of the time, to document the specific needs of women facing war. Ten years later, he set out to find each one and learn what had become of them. Danziger's photographs and the short films formed the basis of the exhibition, which explored themes of personal struggle and the lasting impact of war on these women's lives.




EDWARD BARBER

IWM London, 26 May – 4 September 2016

This popular exhibition offered a contemporary reinterpretation of photographs taken by British documentary photographer, Edward Barber, who recorded major protests staged at key sites such as RAF/USAF Greenham Common, Westminster, Trafalgar Square and the City of London. The body of work is a unique social document of mass popular protest in late twentieth century Britain, which has rarely been seen in public since it was first published in 1984.

Sadly, Edward Barber has passed away since this exhibtion closed.

MAHWISH CHISHTY

IWM London, 19 October 2016 – 19 March 2017

Mahwish Chishty is a US-based artist who was born in Pakistan and grew up in Saudi Arabia. She trained as a miniaturist painter and uses her traditional skills to comment on the very contemporary issue of the drone warfare in Pakistan. Chishty takes the immediately recognisable silhouettes of unmanned aerial vehicles and paints them with decorative folk art patterns, echoing the style in which haulage trucks are decorated in Pakistan. This was Chishty's first solo exhibition outside the USA.

INSPIRING FUTURES; VOLUNTEERING FOR WELLBEING

IWM North, throughout 2016


IWM North, in partnership with Manchester Museum, has been delivering *Inspiring Futures: Volunteering for Wellbeing*, a life-changing social learning programme to support 231 participants into volunteering and away from social and economic isolation. Participants embarked on a bespoke course to develop heritage knowledge, customer service skills, team building and communication skills.

AIR SHOWS

IWM Duxford, 28, 29 May and 10, 11 September 2016

Over 70,000 visitors experienced the speed, power and agility of historic and contemporary fighter aircraft as they dominated the skies over IWM Duxford at the Duxford Air Shows in May and September 2016.





NEW ACQUISTIONS

Since 1917, we have been working hard to ensure that our vast collection remains relevant and significant. Objects help to illuminate and record all relevant aspects of modern war, and of the individual's experience of war, whether military or civilian. During 2016–2017, IWM acquired more than 50 items, two of which are described here.

WORKING DRESS BLOUSE, NO. 5A

An early production navy blue working dress blouse (1944), issued to a hostilities-only RNVR medical officer. This is one of very few attributable uniforms in the collection that relate to a known member of HMS *Belfast*'s company, and one of fewer known to have been worn on service during the Korean War.





BOMB LOCATOR CONTROL UNIT, NO. 1 MARK 3

A post-Second World War bomb locator, as issued to bomb disposal units to locate and pinpoint buried ordnance, both as part of the general post-war clearance but also to react to calls from civilian construction projects when ordnance was discovered. This example, which is rare owing to many similar items being destroyed, was purchased to illustrate the consequences of war, the ongoing impact of the Blitz on the population of Britain and the work of bomb disposal technicians in the post-war period.

CONSERVATION

The effective care of collections is central to the work of IWM. We have a specialist collection care team who ensure the preservation of our unique collections for future generations. The team treated over 300 items and condition checked almost 600 items in 2016, some of which are described here.

DECORATED METAL PANEL

This is a decorated metal panel from the Second World War RAF Lancaster bomber R5692 depicting Donald Duck. The panel was surface cleaned using soft brushes and small areas of corrosion were removed from the reverse. The panel was then attached to a mount for display in the exhibition *Real to Reel: A Century of War Movies* at IWM London.







JACQMAR AND ASCHER SCARF

This Second World War period Jacqmar and Ascher scarf was cleaned, dampened and pinned onto a board to relax the creases and realign the weave. It was then stitched onto custom made padded boards to allow display in the *Fashion on the Ration* exhibition at IWM London and IWM North.
