IWM SHORT 2018 WELCOME

From twerking to wargames, and the claustrophobia of submarines to refugee journeys, IWM Short Film Festival presents challenging, inspiring and experimental films responding to past and contemporary conflict.

Six awards are granted to the most remarkable films in the Festival, and at each screening you can vote for your favourite.

We are delighted to also be presenting free daily screenings of They Shall Not Grow Old, Peter Jackson's (The Hobbit, The Lord of the Rings) artistic response to the First World War, co-commissioned by 14-18 NOW

and IWM. Archive footage has been transformed to present never before seen detail, offering a new perspective on this 20th century conflict to a 21st century audience.

In addition to the free screenings programme at IWM London, we are hosting a ticketed event at Picturehouse Central, which will present the most hard-hitting, relevant and inspiring films relating to war and conflict from our 2018 Film Festival shortlist.

Daytime screenings will be held in the Cinema on Level 1 of IWM London. These screenings are drop-in and free of charge.

Two films which challenge our perceptions of bravery in conflict Fri 26 | Sun 28 | Mon 29 October





This heart-wrenching film tells the story of a soldier in the hours before his execution. Gradually revealing to the audience the events leading up to his desertion, this exploration of the effects of trauma and its consequences challenges our understanding of cowardice and heroism.



This Little Chicken and the Victoria Cross Peter Roch, Jason Davidson 29 mins

During the First World War, Albert McKenzie was just nineteen when he set sail on HMS Vindictive for the Zeebrugge Raid. This gripping film recounts the violent events of the night of 23 April 1918, and how Albert showed immense courage and bravery in the face of the enemy. Albert would become the first London sailor to receive the Victoria Cross.





UB-13 Juri Ferri 12 mins

This claustrophobic First World War drama captures the physical and emotional challenges faced by captain and crew when a German U-boat attempts to avoid detection.

Cunetas (Ditches) !!! Pau Teixidor 19 mins

Cunetas (Ditches) follows the story of a peasant family and their stand against the forces that surround them during the Spanish Civil War. Its intense and dramatic conclusion unsparingly shows the human cost of conflict.



Hangman !!! Steve Gijrath 25 mins

After his plane is shot down, a pilot finds himself tangled in his parachute seven metres from the ground. Too high to cut himself loose, he dangles deep in enemy territory.

Cree Code Talker Alex Lazarowich 13 mins

This compelling documentary about Charles 'Checker' Tomkins, a Canadian Cree Indian, reveals how Canadian Indian languages were used as a code to exchange vital military information during the Second World War.



Stamm ! lacob Grodnik 10 mins

Two soldiers from different sides are unified by their faith and shared humanity. During this unexpected and lifechanging encounter at the Battle of Belleau Wood in 1918. the men must choose between their country and their beliefs.



Burma's Forgotten Army !! Luke Radcliff 18 mins

Interweaving archival material and interviews with Burmese soldiers, this documentary sheds light on the little known but significant contribution of Burmese hill tribes to the Second World War





Triptych !! Katia Lom 8 mins

A combination of live action. poetry and animation brings to life the recollections of the filmmaker's mother who fled Czechoslovakia as a child due to the anti-Semitic Slansky Trials of 1952.

Shemira Adam Wells 22 mins

Shemira is the Jewish tradition of guarding the body from death to burial. This film takes an intimate look at the life of Mever as he spends the night saying goodbye to his beloved wife. Leah. Mever recalls moments they shared from the unexpected, to the seemingly insignificant, to the devastating events of the Holocaust.



A Remembrance lames Russell Cant 19 mins

This unique and experimental film presents two photographs - one lost in childhood but remembered, and the other real but interpreted as an adult. A Remembrance provides a thought-provoking reflection on how we remember the First World War.

Origins Of The Spitfire Tom Andrews 20 mins

Charting the evolution of the iconic Spitfire, this insightful documentary follows the aircraft from its original inception through to its combat during the Battle of Britain.



Doolittle Raiders: A China Story Melinda Liu, Tian Macleod Ji

This fascinating documentary follows the story of American airmen who crash-landed in Japanese-occupied China during the Second World War and reveals why their impact on Chinese society is still felt today.



Saving the Saviours Edward Ions 7 mins

Saving the Saviours illustrates the important and difficult work undertaken by the Dunkirk Little Ships Restoration Trust to preserve the few remaining vessels which helped to evacuate more than 300,000 Allied troops from the shores of France.



Sunday 11 a.m. Joshua Jádi 15 mins

This intriguing film follows Nabi and Dawood, two Afghan refugees, as they convert to Christianity. Set in the suburbs of Vienna, the film reveals their motivations for converting and the difficulties they face as they come to terms with their decision.

Wargames Jessica Bishopp 10 mins

Masculinity, mental health and identity come into play as Celts battle Romans on the wargames table. This unique documentary examines how far war permeates popular culture through table-top strategy games.



Gaza. Sodastream. Guernica, Vajazzle, Twerk. !! Sean Orr 4 mins

An experimental and provocative examination of how we consume information and how it can alter our perceptions of war. This film cleverly blurs the lines between news and entertainment, challenging us to question how we construct meaning in an age of mass media.

Two poignant films looking at the sacrifices – willing and unwilling – made in times of war Thu 25 | Sat 27 | Mon 29 October



Nan's Army Lucy Werrett 10 mins

A complementary mix of animation and interviews recounts the stories of three charismatic women who were children during the Second World War. Nan's Army takes a sharp look at the war on the Home Front and the futility of war.



Bomb Girls: Scarboro's Best Kept Secret Mike Palmer 24 mins

Bomb Girls tells the story of the top secret munitions factory GECO and the remarkable women who worked there. The film adeptly intercuts interviews with former workers and historic footage of the factory operating during the Second World War.



Love and War on Sark Hannah Bayman 14 mins

Amid the suffering of the German occupation of Sark during the Second World War, Phyllis Baker falls in love with a German medic. Despite their contrasting backgrounds, this unlikely love story shows a different side to the occupation whilst reflecting on life and changing attitudes towards Sark today.



The Hun !!! Tyler Mendelson 12 mins

Set in the trenches during the latter stages of the First World War, *The Hun* is an enthralling and probing drama that lays bare the realities of trench warfare and the ever-present threat of death. With mounting tension and allusions to myths and legends, we follow the experiences of Private MacDonald and his American comrades as they prepare for battle.



United Ireland: How Nationalists and Unionists Fought Together in Flanders Enda O'Dowd 30 mins

During the summer of 1917, men from the 16th Irish and 36th Ulster Divisions fought together at the Battle of Messines. Divided by the politics of their home country, these men fought and died together in Flanders Fields. *United Ireland* provides an in-depth look at sacrifices made by these men who put aside their differences in order to fight a common enemy.

Home to the Hangers

A.D. Cooper 6 mins

The stirring and moving words of poet Edward Thomas narrate the story of a traumatised soldier's return to an ancient woodland. The familiar, enveloping landscape prompts him to discard his uniform, and with it, seemingly, the ordeals of war. An imaginative blend of poetry and film that sensitively captures the complexities of identity, inspiration and the search for inner peace.



Silk, Satin and Suffrage Alison Ramsey 10 mins

100 years after the Representation of the People Act was passed, the suffragette banners are still iconic symbols of the campaign. *Silk, Satin and Suffrage* provides a unique insight into how women, having stopped their militant campaign in light of the First World War, channelled their skills and creativity into the fight to gain the vote.



The Sun is God Alice Pennefather 8 mins

A beautifully measured piece that uses dance to explore themes of loneliness, love and longing. Imagining and embodying the emotional, see-saw journey of a wife waiting for her husband to return from war, this sympathetically choreographed ballet expresses emotion in a way that words cannot.



Man Child George Morris 6 mins

An intimate and direct look at the artistic process, this short but powerful documentary will leave you questioning representations of the military in contemporary culture. *Man Child* follows the work of artist Rose Davies as she draws her muse, serving soldier Captain David Williams. Candid reflections on life, art and war also reveal much about their relationship.



Two films highlighting the physical, emotional and psychological impact of conflict on everyday lives Fri 26 | Sun 28 | Mon 29 October



Croste di Polenta !! Emanuele Bonomi 21 mins

In 1915. Matteo is called to enlist in the Austro-Hungarian army but not wanting to fight, he takes shelter in the alpine forest near his home with his best friend, Geremia. Their solace is short-lived as the conflict draws nearer and the young men must come to terms with their situation. A hauntingly beautiful tale of lost innocence, evolving traditions and life-changing choices.



The Butcher of Bosnia !!! Maria Polachowska 23 mins

A revealing insight into the work of the International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia and one of its most high profile cases, the trial of Ratko Mladić. This challenging documentary highlights the harrowing stories from those who lost loved ones, the complex legacy of justice and the enduring impact of the conflict.

They Shall Not Grow Old Peter Jackson 100 mins

25-29 October, 5pm Free daily screenings

Co-commissioned by 14–18 NOW, the UK's arts programme for the First World War centenary, and Imperial War Museums in association with the BBC, They Shall Not Grow Old is internationally renowned director Peter Jackson's (The Hobbit, The Lord of the Rings) artistic response to the First World War. The film has been created exclusively with original footage from Imperial War Museums' film archive and audio from BBC archives. Footage has been colourised and transformed with modern production techniques to present never before seen detail, offering a new perspective on this 20th century conflict to a 21st century audience.

Please note that spaces are limited and will be offered on a first come first served basis. Screenings will start at 5pm in the cinema at IWM London, and no late admissions will be permitted.
